WHO CAN APPLY?

Apprenticeships allow you to gain training and qualifications in your chosen career and get paid.

Anyone 16 or over can apply for an Apprenticeship, and there is no upper age limit. You could be leaving school, sixth form, college, university, or you might already be employed and want to springboard into a new industry or career.

WHY AN APPRENTICESHIP?



Maritime apprenticeships are practically based with lots of time on the water.



Spend 20% of your apprenticeship training, and 80% on the job, but paid for 100% of the time.



There are many levels of apprenticeships allowing career growth.



Your employer pays for your training and your salary. Grants are also available to help you and your employer with costs.



Courses are designed in conjunction with employers needs; therefore, an Apprenticeship leads to qualifications required by employers.

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WHAT WILL I LEARN?

Port Operatives work onboard any type and size of vessel in a port or quayside.

The role can involve cargo such as cars, food, manufactured goods, raw materials or passengers, and enables the efficient onward movement of all cargo.

The work you will do depends on the type of ship, cargo and port; larger ports tend to specialise, whereas smaller ports often require you to perform a wide range of duties.

The training includes loading, unloading, handling and securing cargo, warehousing, storage and retrieval of cargo, roll-on/roll-off (RoRo) vessel operations, on-shore mooring and vessel handling operations, passenger operations, workplace transport operations, infrastructure operations and the operation of heavy machinery as well as specialised port operating equipment.

WHAT DO I NEED?



Enthusiasm and a willingness to learn your chosen trade.



Dedication to ensure you commit to coursework and the job.



Potential apprentices should have a minimum of English and Maths to GCSE (or equivalent) grade C or level 4.

HOW MUCH WILL I GET PAID?

Apprentice salaries are at the discretion of your employer, with many employers paying more than the minimum government requirement.
