HOW DOES IT WORK?

Hiring an apprentice is an effective way to grow talent and develop a motivated, skilled and qualified workforce. You can adapt their training to your business needs and expand and up-skill your workforce.

Apprentices can be school/sixth form leavers, uni graduates, employees, or potential employees who want to further their career or change career direction. You can hire someone new or an existing employee, so long as they are 16 or over.

BENEFITS:

- Government funding will pay for 95 - 100% of the fees.
- There is an apprentice minimum wage, which is approximately half that of the national minimum wage, moving up to the national minimum wage after a year and if they are over 19 years old.
- You employ and train an apprentice, and we train them to get them certified.
- We can help in the recruitment process if required and provide periodic reviews to ensure that the apprentice stays on track.

If your company pays into the Apprenticeship Levy, you pay no more contributions. If you are not a 'levy payer', your company pays 5% of the £25,000 training fee, therefore £1,250 over the apprenticeship term of 18 - 24 months.

The only extra costs are apprentice travel and accommodation if required.

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WHAT WILL THEY LEARN?

Small commercial vessel crewmembers work on various specialist vessels and operate in many different marine environments, from the construction of offshore wind farms to providing a range of services within ports or inland waterways.

They may also act as support vessels in major salvage operations or wreck removal. Alternatively, they may be involved in sail training or charter.

Workboat crew members will learn:

- Communications - including use of VHF and UHF radios, mobile telephone and IT.
- Navigation and vessel handling – the ability to manoeuvre the workboat and check position using bridge equipment.
- Berthing – bring workboat alongside and handling mooring ropes to secure the workboat.
- Towing operations and laying moorings – using winches to handle ropes, wires and chains.
- Personnel transfers – ensuring all precautions are taken to allow the safe transfer to other boat or structure.
- Cargo handling – assist in slinging of loads, crane operations and securing cargo on board the vessel.

This qualification will ensure that the crew person is competent in a wide range of skills and can work independently during operations in a fast-changing environment.
